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The Dozenal Society of America is a voluntary, nonprofit educational corporation, organized for the conduct of research and education of the public in the use of dozenal (also called duodecimal or base twelve) in calculations, mathematics, weights and measures, and other branches of pure and applied science.

UR ANNUAL meeting was held on Saturday, 2 November, at the CIC Center in Boston! It was an excellent location, secured for us by our vice president, Graham Steele (#3zo). In attendence were Graham, John Volan (#418), Jay Schiffman (#2z8), Donald Goodman (#398), and new member #571, Mikey.

Of foremost discussion were our struggles releasing the Bulletin. Our editor, John Volan, has been experiencing a great press of personal and professional business for some time, preventing the release of our next volume. Remembering that we are an all-volunteer organization, this sort of thing can happen, and in fact has happened from time to time in the past. Jay Schiffman, our longest-serving member, having been through similar situations, suggested that one or more associate editors be appointed to ease the burden of preparing the next issue. In that vein, Donald Goodman and Graham Steele were appointed associate editors, and we formed the goal of having the next official issue released sometime this December.

Michael deVlieger (#37¢), our secretary and formerly both president and editor, had already volunteered to produce a special issue honoring Gene Zirkel (#67), a long-time stalwart of the Society, without whom it arguably would have died several dozen years ago. Gene joined the Society in its seventh year, in 1167 (1951.), and took up the presidency in 1190 (1980), shortly after the death of president Tom Linton, when it appeared that the Society was very near the ashbin of history. He and his wife, Pat, not only saved but revitalized it, and Gene played an

important role in bringing in many of the leaders of the Society today. That special issue should also be released this week.

The Board voted a special award to Gene for his long-time service and dedication to the Society and the cause of dozens and of non-decimal bases in general, which we will present to his wife, Pat, in the next few months. The particulars of the award will be determined shortly.

Jay Schiffman, by far the longest-time friend and comember of Gene, gave a moving paean to his friend, for which the Board thanks him.

The Board further discussed that, for several years, our education committe chair, Jen Seron (#372), had arranged for our annual meetings to coincide with educational conferences, enabling some crosspollination with these systems. She was further able to have the Society make actual presentations to these organizations; e.g., to the American Society for Engineering Education and to the National Conference for Teachers of Mathematics. Since family concerns have prevented much of her activity in recent years, the Society has been unable to do much of this. Graham suggested that he still has some connections at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT), and also noted that Boston is a city with many institutes of higher learning that are bound to have math clubs and similar organizations with significant overlap with the DSA's mission.

The membership therefore voted to have our next annual meeting in Boston again. We would like to have it earlier, perhaps in August or September, and try to coincide with various conferences that occur in Boston at that time. We will also attempt to advertise the meeting at local universities and similar locations in the hopes of drawing further interest.

Finally, our annual meeting this year was organized much too late to be able to gather the attendence that we'd like, or that we've been accustomed to in recent years. The Board resolved to have the meeting arranged much earlier, to facilitate the attendance of those in a position to come in per-

son. We further would like to have in place some real video-conferencing systems to allow digital participation (we had several members ask about this, but unfortunately no ability to really effectuate it), and perhaps explore live-streaming options. If you have knowledge or experience in this area, please contact us and let us know; we'd love to have your help!

We closed with John Volan giving a very interesting presentation on a piece of software he had developed, which permits the development of an entire metric system, in any base, from the beginning setting of a few parameters. We discussed a number of the aspects of metric system design, and had a very informative informal discussion about this issues before adjourning.

So keep in mind, until we have some further details, August or September of next year, in Boston.
